A Ministry of Listening

In the present climate it can be of no surprise that so many are struggling both materially, spiritually and psychologically. So many carrying so many different burdens. So many seeking ways of lessening, off loadings these burdens.

I wonder how good are you at listening? In 1935, at the height of his career, the author, Earnest Hemingway wrote, "When people talk, listen completely, most people don't listen". Listening is not just about hearing, it is so much more. How often, when you meet someone or pass them in the street, do, you say, "Hi, how are you?" You are only expecting, probably wanting, only



one reply, "Good, thank you". So often we do not pick up on the non verbal communication that all is not really fine. And even when we do we feel awkward and do not follow up with, "Are you really good, is everything really OK?"

Real listening takes the three 'E's', effort, empathy enthusiasm. To listen to see all the signs. Real listening can be exhausting, and of course real listening takes time, the most precious of gifts, the most demanding of ourselves. Each one of us has a mission, a ministry, within our communities and a huge part of that ministry concerns listening and by listening we help release, ease, so many burdens people around us carry. The ministry of listening, of burden sharing cannot be underestimated, or understated. Christ himself is waiting for us to talk with him, and believe it or not, you can tell him anything. There is nothing he has heard before, nothing that will shock or horrify. He listens, as we all must with full attention and grace; that unconditional love for each one of us. He actively encouraged everybody to come to him, to talk with him. "Knock and the door will be opened". I thankfully haven't heard this for many a long year, "Children should be seen and not heard". It was never, and never will be appropriate.

A Chaplain friend of mine gives all who will hear a simple model of Jesus', and our listening ministry. He pulls up an empty chair and invites the person to imagine Jesus sitting in the chair. Just loving them, willing, wanting them to unburden themselves on him. And you can tell him anything, in any way, in any language. He will be listening and understand where you are. He recalls a young man who he visited in hospital who said to him, padre, he was ex services, I don't think I belief in God or Jesus. To which he replied, "that's fine, he believes in you".

You know we are called to sit in the chair and be the physical presence of Christ and listen, listen with all our senses to anyone who is willing and ready to unburden themselves. Be prepared to be open and giving of that most precious of commodities, your time, because once spent you can never retrieve it.

Jesus says, "Come to me all who labour and are heavy laden, and I will give you rest. Take my yoke upon you, and learn from me, for I am gentle and lowly in heart, and YOU WILL FIND REST for your souls. For my yoke is easy and my burden light".

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One of Jan Cossins' chosen charities as Mayor of Darlington this year is the "Listening Post", a project initiated by the Darlington Area Churches Youth Ministry. It seeks to be there for young people with mental health and well-being issues; so that in the listening to help to prevent these issues escalating into something long lasting, life defining.

A recent Princes's Trust report stated that 50%, half, of young people experience mental health and well being issues during their school and college years that severely prevent and restrict them from focusing on their studies. The aim of the Listening Post is of course to prevent these issues becoming intensified and life defining.

This is a response from a young person who had experienced the ministry of the Listening Post. "Counselling never worked for me, but listening did. Being able to be fully in control of the conversation and what you wanted to talk about that day actually made it enjoyable. Some days you just want to focus on the positive, having someone there just to listen means that every session you don't have to talk about everything that's going wrong, you can be grateful as well, which I found rarely happened in counselling. This also let me build up a relationship with someone in school who I could talk to, which made me more likely to open up and sometimes even catch a problem before it escalated.

Having somebody in school who wasn't a teacher to talk to, is a lot less intimidating as well. Some stuff you just don't want teachers to know. I know loads of people who struggle with things because they were scared if they told someone they would get into trouble. I never had this problem as I was given a safe environment which was the only place I ever got to fully focus on me. I wouldn't have got through my GCSE's without the support; just an hour a week to unload to someone stopped everything building up and seeming overwhelming. I had some one there to listen, not everyone is that lucky". A sixteen year old person.

I very briefly want to make three observations:

- Firstly, listening is not just listening to someone's issues problems but also a time for sharing their joys and their positives. How great is that? That is also a vital and important part of prayer, real communication. I wonder how often we encourage those around us to share those highs of the week, to see and hear the joy; how often in our prayers do we share the joys of being community, being happy, being loved? Because, as the person said, "some days you just want to focus on the positives". As far back as the early 50's an American pastor, the Rev Norman Peake, wrote a book called, "The power of positive thinking". The book is based on his Christian faith and often quoted in psychological works. He argues that so often speaking of our joys and positives can drastically reduce our negative thoughts and anxieties. He stated that each day he regularly says to himself, "If God is for me, who can be against me" and "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me", "I am in God's hands".
- Secondly, in the listening the young person was so grateful that the focus was fully on them. It wasn't about the listener's agenda but their agenda or thoughts. You are important, so I am listening completely.. Jesus listens with one agenda, to focus on you, where you are. So 'your' sorrows and joys, you!
- Thirdly, Yes young people can be so vulnerable, but so are so many other people of differing ages and backgrounds, no one is immune. The Samaritans are an incredible organisation whose sole purpose is to listen, completely and in doing so bring healing. I read that the Samaritans telephone lines receive 400 calls per day by people consumed by money worries.

Do not underestimate or undervalue your listening Ministry because Jesus doesn't. Jesus is waiting, sitting in the chair, listening. Are you as his disciples waiting too?



amazing models we made.








Lent Groups

Bags of Peace





BREAKING NEWS: DARLINGTON CHURCH AWARDED £12,000 TO INSPIRE AND INVOLVE COMMUNITY IN NATURE CONSERVATION OF HIDDEN WOODLAND ON SLOPING HILLSIDE LINKING TOWN AND COUNTRY ON WESTERN EDGE OF DARLINGTON.

Wouldn't it be wonderful if that were true?......Well we have news for you - it is!

Elm Ridge Methodist Church has received a grant of £12,400 from a charitable trust at the Community Foundation Tyne & Wear and Northumberland "for development of relic woodland and wetland on the premises for ecological and community benefits." The grant has been given on the understanding that our intention is to work with the Durham Wildlife Trust and involve the town-wide community. To measure the outcome of the project, a number of objectives have been set including the establishment of a voluntary group to deliver and sustain the project which would continue beyond the one year life of the grant. Information would be assembled as to the number of people involved in the project, with a record of people's experiences and photographs of site works and events, to show the changes and improvements brought about by the project.

Through their generous donation, the Trustees have put their faith in us. Now the opportunity and the challenge is for us to put our faith into practical action and to demonstrate our commitment to care for God's creation on the land in our stewardship, in ways which inspire and involve the community in enjoyment and on-going care in the years ahead.

We begin with a get-together on Sunday afternoon 17 March with the "Ready to Roll" event to which YOU are invited. Friends and Families will be very welcome too! We had a good turnout for the site visit in October. Let's have an even better one for this event.

In addition we hold other activities, including CAMEO, come and meet each other, on Thursday mornings where we can hold and host various craft activities such as bread making, making poppies at Remembrance time, angels for Christmas etc. Our activities can be of general interest, but may be themed to seasonal and church activities.

The local community police also often drop in and it is a great opportunity to just chat to them in a social environment. There is a great feeling of fellowship and general togetherness.

Although we are not actually eating a meal together, it is a great way to get to know others better, so if you are free some Monday morning then 'Drop-in'. You will always be made very welcome.




On Maundy Thursday, Rev Colin Roberts is leading a service @ 7pm




